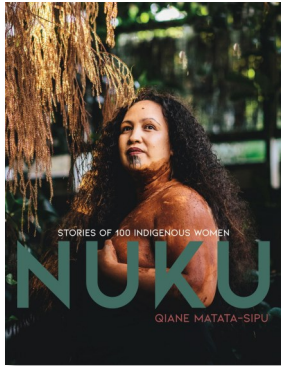


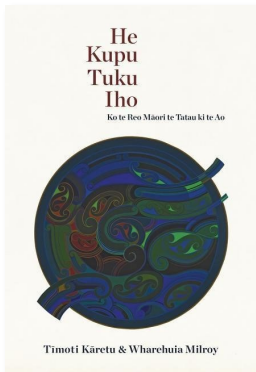
Ngā Pukapuka | Books

With simple lucidity and great expertise, Keri Opai shares the spirit and meaning of what it is to be Māori in the 21st century. 305.8 OPA NZ

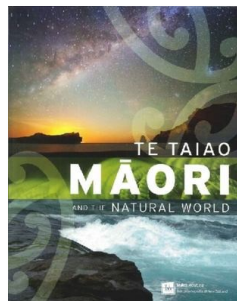


He Kupu Tuku Iho by Timoti Karetu and Wharehuia Milroy

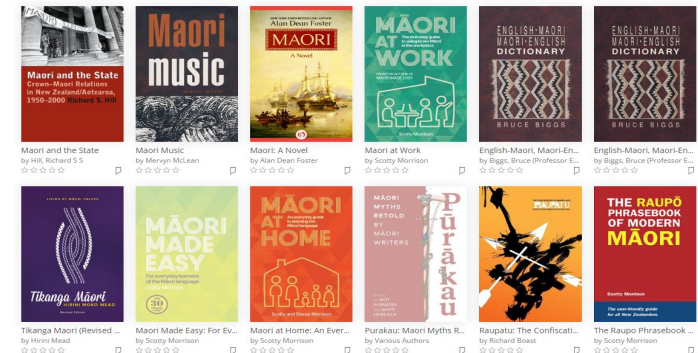

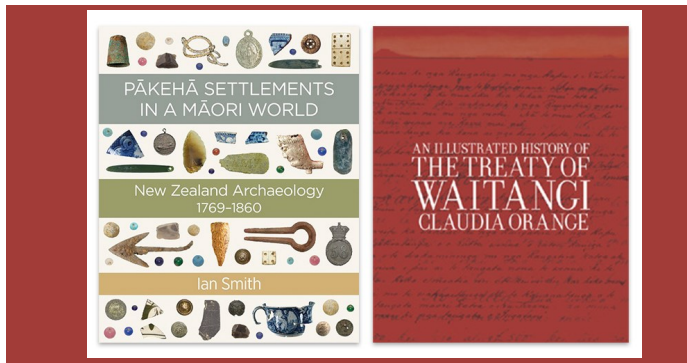
Great Te Arawa Stories has been collated for students and teachers to learn about the kōrero of Te Arawa. The option is available to read in Te Reo Māori or English.
